Pop Art

Pop Art of the 1960's is the theme I have decided to follow and create a text set for my students. The Pop Art text set is orientated towards eleventh and twelfth grade students studying painting, printmaking, and art history. In addition to learning broadly about the development and reasoning for the creation of Pop Art, I have added texts related to two prominent artists in the Pop Art movement. The artists I will have the students read and research are Andy Warhol and Roy Lichtenstein, both of these artists were at the forefront and popularity of Pop Art and should be recognizable to the students. Included in the text sets are large visual art books, biographical internet websites, obituaries, and quotations by the artists these books and articles should interest the students to learn further about Pop Art and the artists themselves. These texts will be used to write about Pop Art, Andy Warhol, Roy Lichtenstein, and create original artworks inspired by Pop Art.

Summary

This is an art book with many visual representations of artwork from various artists and art forms. This book follows the creation of the Pop Art movement from its beginnings as a reaction against abstract expressionism to the end of the modern art era and the beginning of post-modernist art. The book includes full page visuals of art produced by a wide range of artists that influenced the creation of Pop Art to that of artists that were influenced by Pop Art itself. Representations of paintings, silk screens, sculptures, installation pieces, and multi media artworks are shown within the visual reproductions of this book. The text itself is chronologically ordered to inform the reader of the reasoning behind the creation of Pop Art, its impact on the art world, and how it is continuing to inspire artists today.

Readability

This books readability is at a 12th grade level using the Fry Readability Graph. The book is also largely visual with many artworks for the students to look at without having to understand art vocabulary. The book helps students to understand what the author is describing by being able to look at visual aid while reading the text.

This encyclopedia's readability is at a 9th Grade reading level according to the Fry Readability chart. The website also has many visuals and links to other textual learning resources.

Readability

This newspaper obituaries readability is at a 15th grade reading level according to the Fry Readability Chart. The obituary uses long words having to do with art and artisan vocabulary making it challenging for high school students but still very readable since the students will know that the article is having to do with the death of Warhol.
